		RD gave a presentation on operations.  Constitution Notes to Note the RCNI.
		<ul> <li>Operation Nackett, N Ireland – GLA officers were assisted by the PSNI in executing a Search Warrant in relation to Section 12 of the</li> </ul>
		Gangmasters(Licensing) Act 2004 offence involving shellfish. 3 people
		were arrested. A report is being prepared for submission to the
		Prosecution Service in Northern Ireland. This was a cross-border issue,
		the workers being taken over the border from the Republic.
		Operation Senator - multi agency led by GLA & HMRC Special
		Investigations as a result of numerous allegations including
		PAYE/VAT/UKBA offences and accomodation/exploitation/illegal supply of workers. The main offender was arrested for GLA offences and
		bailed until end of July. £4K in unpaid wages was found at his address.
		The GLA is ensuring that this is paid to the workers. UKBA detained 20
		persons at a farm for immigrations offences.
		Park Royal – Enforcement Awareness event led by the GLA to be held
		on 3 August for businesses on the Park Royal Industrial Estate. The
		event is to be supported by HMRC, NMW, HSE, UKBA & ACAS together with major retailers. The Deputy Lord Mayor of London will open the
		event. Angie Bray MP will also be attending.
		<ul> <li>Thanet Earth – GLA investigations following an aggressive campaign led</li> </ul>
		by UNITE. 117 allegations, mainly historical were received by UNITE. 3
		LPs investigated by the GLA resulting in potential sanctions for one only.
		UNITE are continuing to target the LU and major retailers. There is
		much media interest. TUC stressed the need for an MOU and asked to
		discuss the details of the investigation outside of the meeting.
		Operation Nighthawk – 2 Lithuanian nationals residing in Norfolk were

		<ul> <li>arrested by GLA officers for section 12 offences. This operation was assisted by Norfolk Police which involved executing warrants at five further addresses simultaneously. Amongst items seized were a large number of credit/debit cards, firearm ammunition and CS spray. Both of the men arrested are subject to police bail whilst further enquiries continue. Further enquires are continuing around accommodation irregularities.</li> <li>A K R Services Ltd – the licence for this company was recently revoked with immediate effect. Among the reasons for revocation were false invoicing, workers bullied and threatened, holiday leave not paid, wages withheld. One worker worked a 22 hour shift then returned the following day to work a further 8 hours. Another worker worked an 88 hour shift.</li> <li>Dairy Investigation – the legal arguments presented on 11 July 2011 by the defence were not accepted. The trial will take place on 24 October. The labour users are being prosecuted first as the offences have a 6 month time limit for charging. The labour provider offences are not time limited.</li> <li>Spring Onions – an exercise is to be conducted in the West Midlands during the summer to examine the supply of labour to both the retail and wholesale supply chain</li> <li>Operations 2010-11 – GLA investigations revealed 845 exploited workers and financial exploitation of c£2.5m. 12 high profile operations took place during this period. 91% of intelligence-led operations identified serious non-compliances.</li> <li>Action:</li> <li>Link to the 2010-11 Annual Report &amp; Accounts to be placed on GLA website.</li> <li>Consider use of more wide ranging pictures in future publications.</li> </ul>

The Chalfont Drive site is due for closure on 31 March 2012.</li> <li>A business case has been put forward with a view on our preferred location, the ultimate decision lies with Defra estates.</li> <li>A presentation to Office based staff has been made.</li> <li>The risk of losing staff and the cost of the move and disruption is of concern.</li> <li>Efficiencies have to be achieved in the relocation which includes 25% less m².</li> <li>ARC were concerned about the impact of much larger costs as the GLA is limited to the government estate which may not meet commercial rates.</li> </ul>

10.3	Government Review	<ul> <li>Note</li> <li>The Davey Review – number of consultations but currently looking at initial recommendations and how to make enforcement more efficient. Considering structure and penalties. The initial findings will be ready by October 2011 and there may be a public consultation on these findings.</li> <li>Forestry Regulations Taskforce – industry has asked for a review of the regulations, PW gave evidence on this issue and there will be recommendations relating to the GLA. The T.O.R excludes employment law but managed to include GLA regime.</li> <li>IL discussed the MacDonald Review of Farming and invited comments from the Board on the following recommendations.  Communications and perceptions</li> <li>4.62 NFU wants farmers and growers to be aware of guidance. NFU are concerned that farmers may not understand their responsibilities. NJ suggested that exclusive ownership of the guidance was not necessary as guidance has been around for a long time.</li> <li>4.63 GLA plans to enhance its communication with labour users.  Inspections and Enforcement</li> <li>4.64 Forestry pilot will be extended to other sectors if it is successful.</li> <li>4.65 There were several comments about this as the GLA has adopted a risk-based approach. HR commented that self-assessment will not guarantee compliance and so we should not be quick to move away from inspections. As stated earlier earned recognition is difficult to define.</li> <li>4.66 Inspectors work to the code of practice.</li> <li>4.67 GLA tries to minimise the disruption on workers when conducting interviews.</li> <li>4.69 The GLA works closely with LU's and does not use active checks to target them.  An alternative to licensing</li> <li>4.70 This is what is set out in the Act. Other reviews may make recommendations that the Government will need to consider.</li> <li>Action</li> <li>11.
